## The scope of practice for an East Asian medicine practitioner in the state of Washington includes the following:

- Acupuncture and Eastern medicine means a health care service utilizing acupuncture and Eastern medicine therapeutic treatments, such as the practice of acupuncture techniques and herbal medicine to maintain and promote wellness, prevent, manage, and reduce pain, and treat substance use disorder;
- Use of presterilized, disposable needles, such as filiform needles, and other acupuncture needles, syringes, or lancets to directly and indirectly stimulate meridians and acupuncture points including ashi points, motor points, trigger points, and other nonspecific points throughout the body;
- Use of electrical, mechanical, or magnetic devices to stimulate meridians and acupuncture points including ashi points, motor points, trigger points, and other nonspecific points throughout the body;
- Intramuscular needling and dry needling of trigger points and other nonspecific points throughout the body in accordance with acupuncture and Eastern medicine training;
- All points and protocols for ear acupuncture including auricular acupuncture, national acupuncture detoxification association protocol, battlefield acupuncture, and the Nogier system;
- Use of contact needling and noninsertion tools such as teishin, enshin, or zanshin;
- Moxibustion
- Acupressure;
- Cupping;
- Dermal friction technique;
- Infrared;
- Sonopuncture;
- Laserpuncture;
- Point injection therapy defined as meaning the subcutaneous, intramuscular and intradermal injection of substances with the practice of acupuncture to stimulate meridians, acupuncture points, ashi points, motor points, trigger points and other nonspecific points throughout the body. DOES not include injections of controlled substances.
- Dietary advice and health education based on acupuncture or Eastern medical theory, including the recommendation and sale of herbs, vitamins, minerals, and dietary and nutritional supplements;
- Breathing, relaxation, and Eastern exercise techniques;
- Qi gong;
- Eastern massage and Tui na (which is a method of Eastern bodywork); and
- Superficial heat and cold therapies.
